
My California Community Tool

Every ten years, after the U.S. Census, California must redraw the boundaries of its Congressional, State Senate, State Assembly, and State Board of Equalization districts to reflect the new population data. The Voters FIRST Act (2008) gave this power to the people of California with the creation of the California Citizens Redistricting Commission (Commission). The Commission is committed to drawing fair districts that reflect the best interests of the people, not the incumbent politicians.

But to do this, we need your input! Through this document, you can make sure the Commission knows about your community by telling the Commission what is important to you, drawing a map of your community, and submitting your community feedback directly to the Commission. EXAMPLE #1

I live in a unique area of Farmers Branch called Oak Knoll Valley. The neighborhood is bounded between Highway 9 on the west and Sunnyside River on the east side. It is primarily a residential area with some areas zoned for commercial and mixed use, especially along the river. The languages spoken in Oak Knoll Valley are primarily English and Spanish with some residents speaking Vietnamese and Mandarin. Across the river from Oak Knoll Valley is the community of River Glen, which is similar to our community as it is primarily residential. We are in the same school district, and the high school which Oak Knoll students attend is in River Glen. It would make sense that we would be included in the same legislative or Congressional district.

EXAMPLE #2

I live in Bear City, an industrial and commercial area next to Highway 9 and the 5-interstate freeway. Our community runs from Maple Street to Oak Street and from Green Drive and Fork Road. Most of the residents live in multi-family apartment buildings, and many of them are new to the area. Bear City has its own school district, and most residents speak English. Our community should not be included with River City, which is on the other side of the 5-interstate freeway. River City is composed of single-family homes and their needs are very different from ours.

Maps should provide us with enough information – the streets, highways, or natural features that are the boundaries of the community – to be able to understand where your community of interest is located. They do not require any detail beyond that.
